### The Organs of Oberlin

The members and friends of the Lorain County Chapter of the American Guild of Organists had a rare and delightful opportunity on Saturday, October 17, 2015, to see, hear, and do organ crawls at four of the 29 organs that belong to Oberlin College. Our host for the afternoon was David Kazimir, Curator of Organs at Oberlin, who explained and demonstrated features of four of the organs. Brief recitals were played on each of the four instruments by our Dean, Brian Wentzel.

The first organ visited was the <u>Brombaugh</u>, ¼ comma mean tone organ in Fairchild Chapel. Among its interesting features are short octaves and split sharps and flats. Brian demonstrated the organ with the performance of compositions by Sweelinck.

The Silberman replica organ by Bozeman-Gibson, owned by Oberlin College, at Peace Community Church in Oberlin was our second stop. The somewhat interesting, but difficult, history of the organ included being installed at the State University of New York at Stoney Brook, then through floods and changes of ownership being removed from Stoney Brook, stored in a barn in Oberlin, then moved to Rochester, New York, and again back to Oberlin where it found a home through the College at the Peace Community Church. We enjoyed Brian's playing of music by J.S. Bach on this instrument.

The third instrument on our tour was the <u>Flentrop</u>, 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries North European Style organ in Warner Concert Hall. This elegant organ is the principal "workhorse" organ for student lessons and performances at the college. Buxtehude and Mendelssohn were the featured composers for Brian's performance on the Flentrop.

The last instrument visited was the <u>Fisk</u> organ of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century French Romantic Style in Finney Chapel. The organ, which replaced a large Skinner, was influenced by the organs of Cavaillé-Coll. Works by Franck and Vierne, played by Brian, concluded our afternoon of interesting and stimulating exposure to the beauties of the Organs of Oberlin.
